

On Wednesday, January 18, 2023, Local 863 held a Special Resolutions meeting in which all resolutions for both the National and Local contracts submitted were read. Members who attended voted to accept or deny each individual resolution. Over 200 resolutions were submitted by our members. With so many resolutions turned in, it was encouraging to see our members voice their ideas and concerns in ways that could make our contracts stronger. The accepted resolutions will be sent

Both the current National and Local contracts expire on September 14, 2023. Contract years can become tough. We ask our members to prepare for all outcomes of a contract negotiation, which could include a strike. With so much at stake in the upcoming National Negotiations, the Membership needs to be willing to stand together and show the company we will do what is necessary to make sure we get the contract we ALL deserve.

The Resolutions were read at the Special Resolutions Meetings at the Local on January 18, 2023. There were a number of great resolutions submitted. I want to thank everyone who attended those meetings. The Bargaining Committee was very pleased with the amount of resolutions that were submitted. These resolutions are important to give our National and Local Leadership ideas what our Membership wants going into negotiations.

As we move forward in to February, we are preparing to launch the midnight shift for 10R areas. This additional shift is due to the 10R80 volume increase. There will be roughly 170 new members hired in February and

UAW members to research both candidates background credentials and experience levels and vote for the candidate that you feel will represent you and your interests better as the UAW International President. All ballots must be received in Ohio by February 28th, 2023. This will be a historical election! This is the first time in 87 years that an International UAW President will be elected by a one member one vote system instead of Constitution Delegates representing the entire UAW membership.

I personally have firsthand experience in the one member one vote process. I worked for Roadway Express Trucking from 1990 until November

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March. All jobs were posted on Tuesday January 31, 2023, which allowed the membership the ability to job bid in advance. I would like to thank the Bargaining Committee for meeting with the company and getting that done. The company has also notified the Committee that there will be a shutbown in 2023.

Ford Motor Company recently reported strong earnings for 2022. With that being said, it is projected that the average Profit Sharing payments this year will be \$9,176 for eligible members. This payment is usually made the second week of March. Actual payouts will be based on compensated hours over the course of the plan year.

Congratulations to Jason Gordon. Jason was elected by the membership on Tuesday, January 24, 2023 to fill the open Bargaining Position. Jason is a great addition to the Bargaining Committee and will do a great job for the membership.

In closing, I want to send condolences to the families and membes who have recently lost loved ones. You and your families are in our prayers.

of 1999. I was a member of Teamsters Local 100 during that time frame. Ron Carey was the first Teamster General President elected by a direct vote of the Teamster membership. Ron Carey served as President of the International Brotherhood of Teamsters from 1991-1997. Ron Carey ran for re-election in 1996 and won, but in 1997 federal investigators discovered that the Carey campaign had engaged in an illegal donation kickback scheme to raise more than \$700,000 for the 1996 re-election effort.

His re-election was overturned and he was disqualified from running for Teamsters President again. He was subsequently expelled from the Teamsters Union for life. Although a federal jury ultimately cleared him of

Here we are in 2023 heading toward spring hopefully sooner than later. There have been a lot of changes for both active and retirees coming into this year. Hopefully it has not been too rough a transition for our retirees with the new plans. The (VEBA) Trust has been very helpful in getting whatever issues arise trying to get them worked out.

Attention Retirees: Your OTC (Over the Counter) benefits renewed this year. United Health Care & BCBS ECP plan members received \$150 each, while the BCBS TCN members get \$50 each. Please take advantage of this benefit. You can log online at www.uawtrust.org Benefits > OTC or call for assistance to 877-218-9951.

If you have not received your new United Health Care cards you should call the RHCC at 1-866-637-7555 and let them know right away. A few of you have called looking for your OPTUM Rx cards, if you are on United Health Care the OPTUM Rx information is on your UHC card already you will use it for both Medical and Prescriptions. If you have BCBS ECP or TCN you should have received a separate OPTUM Rx card in the mail.

Making sure your address is current is imperative to you getting all the information that you will need. If you have recently moved, please make sure you keep your address updated you should call the RHCC at 1-866-637-7555 ASAP to update or verify your mailing address.

Attention Active Employees Only: Members that have SuperMed Ohio HMO (MedMutual) I am sure most of you are seeing some of the cost changes this year that were rolled out for 2023. Be aware that procedures or outpatient surgeries have a copay of \$100 (ex. Cortisone shots) have been getting billed with a \$100 copay. If you choose to stay on the plan just keep in mind that there will be cost, you have not seen over the years. If you choose to select another Health care plan you can call the NESC 1-800-248-4444 or do a Rolling Enrollment on the myfordbenefits.com website.

MetLife Open Enrollment should be coming up soon as soon as I get the dates, I will post them on the information systems in the plant.

Watch for this information soon.

I have mentioned this time and time again, when you are going for Physical Therapy and you have National PPO BCBS plan you MUST go in NETWORK with Theramatrix (see the back of your card) Go to the website to find in network locations at www.theramatrix.com or call the number on the back of your card. You will be paying out of pocket if you go out of network. It is imperative that you stay in network with all your coverages. It is your responsibility to make sure you are going to an IN-NETWORK provider. If you have any doubts, go to the websites, and verify or call the number of the back of your cards.

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Education Committee Report by Monique Stanfield, Chair



Let's Talk About It....

I know that many lately have been discouraged about voting. This timeline shows the massive change in the RIGHT to vote in the U.S. Elections.

Voting was limited to white male property owners only. The original Constitution left voting rights to the states for a range of reasons, including a compromise over slavery and the fact that the concept of setting up a representative democracy was new.

July 9, 1868: Citizenship Granted to All US-Born and Naturalize.

The 14th Amendment is ratified, granting citizenship to all people "born or naturalized in the United States" and "equal protection under the laws," including formerly enslaved people.

February 3, 1870: Black Men Granted the Right to Vote

The 15th Amendment is ratified, granting Black men the right to vote and Congress the power to enforce the right. However, laws, including poll taxes, literacy tests and grandfather clauses, are enacted in mostly Southern states, suppressing Black voting rights until 1965.

August 18, 1920: Women Get the Right to Vote

The 19th Amendment is adopted, granting American women the right to vote: However, its passage does not stop mostly Southern states from restricting minority women from voting through the passage of discriminatory laws.

June 2, 1924: Native Americans Granted the Right to Vote

The <u>Indian Citizenship Act</u>, granting the right to vote to Native Americans born in the United States.

August 6, 1965: Voting Rights Act
President Johnson signs the Voting
Rights Act into law, banning literacy
tests and enforcing the 15th
Amendment on a federal level.

July 1, 1971: 18 and Up Can Vote
The 26th Amendment is signed by
President Richard Nixon, granting
the right to vote to U.S. citizens who
are 18 or older.

August 6, 1975: Rights for Non-English-Speaking Voters

President Gerald Ford requiring districts with significant numbers of non-English-speaking voters to be provided with instructions or assistance in registering and voting.

June 29, 1982: Voting Rights Act Extended

President Ronald Reagan signs a 25-year extension of the <u>Voting Rights</u> <u>Act</u>. Revisions also reverse recent decisions by the U.S. Supreme Court, making voting easier for people with disabilities and the elderly.

September 28, 1984: Voting Is Made Accessible

The Voting Accessibility for the Elderly and Handicapped Act of 1984 is signed into law by Reagan, requiring polling places in federal elections to be accessible for people with disabilities and the elder. It also states that if no accessible location is available, an alternative way to vote on Election Day must be offered.

May 20, 1993: Voter Registration Through DMVs

National Voter Registration Act of 1993 is signed into law by President Bill Clinton.

October 29, 2002 U.S Election Assistance Commission

President George W. Bush signs the Help America Vote Act mandating improvements and certification of voting equipment, maintain the National Voter Registation form and administer a national elections clearinghouse with shared practices.

Congressman John Lewis stated "Your vote matters. If it didn't, why would some peope keep trying to take it away?"

What one may see as right for one person, another person may see it totally differently. When both views are not wrong, most people vote on what they put their efforts to learn. Remember to do your <u>OWN</u> research. Whatever policy, law, political party, association, influence, rumor or person you vote for...know Your <u>RIGHTS</u>...You have the right to vote and Your vote does matter!



The William E. Hoffman UAW Local 863 Retired Workers Chapter and UAW Local 863 is again sponsoring its annual scholarship program for High School Seniors who are the descendants of Local 863 Members (i.e., sons, stepsons, grandsons, step-grandsons, daughters, stepdaughters, granddaughters, step-granddaughters).

The Hoffman-Combs Scholarship Fund is named in honor of former Local 863 President William E. Hoffman, and former Vice-President and former Retired Workers Chapter Chairman Kenneth Combs.

There will be three (3) scholarships awarded. The Scholarship Winners will be announced on June 6, 2023.

First Prize: \$(To Be Determined) Second Prize: \$(To Be Determined) Third Prize: \$(To Be Determined) Each scholarship award will be payable directly to the college, university, trade school, or career center.

Eligible applicants may enroll in the 2023 Hoffman-Combs Scholarship Fund competition by following the steps below:

- Each applicant must complete an application form.
- 2) Each applicant must obtain a letter of acceptance or receipt of enrollment to the college, university, trade school, or career center of their choice.
- Each applicant must submit a complete copy of his/her high school academic records.
- 4) Each applicant must write an essay on the topic: How has the political, economic, and social climate over the years influenced and shaped the UAW? Explain how the global economy has impacted the Labor movement and working-class people in the United States. What are some of the challenges Labor Unions face moving forward? Give examples of current and proposed legislation and laws that could help Unions grow stronger in the future.

This essay should be typewritten and a minimum of five (5) double spaced pages and not more than nine (9) pages, excluding the title page, works cited page, and bibliography.

- Essays must include a bibliography from at least five serious scholar sources/replicable sources.
- Essays must speak to the topic.
- Essays will be disqualified for plagiarizing. Document all quotes or ideas/opinions from outside sources following a standard documentation format such as MLA, APA, or CSE, and include Works Cited page at the end of the essay. Cite all sources for quotations and ideas that are not your own, using footnotes or endnotes. This is not the same as a bibliography.

Each essay should display an understanding of Union development and philosophy. It should be cohesive with continuity and style. The essay should be readable and grammar may be a deciding factor when all other factors

Essays will be evaluated on: (1) Theme Development, (2) Expression, (3) Documentation and (4) Usage.


