From there they were broken down into correct Articles and Sections within the National Contract and were voted on by the Sub Councils. The UAW National Ford Council will then meet in June to vote to approve resolutions which will then become demands for negotiations.

An election for our UAW-Ford Sub Council 5 Financial Secretary vacancy was held during our Sub Council meetings. I was honored to be elected as UAW-Ford Sub Council 5 Financial Secretary. I would like to thank our fellow UAW Presidents and UAW-Ford Unit Chairmen in Sub Council 5 for putting their faith in me once again.

During the week of March 27-29, 2023, the UAW National Collective Bargaining Comvention was held in Detroit, Michigan. At this convention, an overall philosophy on UAW resolutions were read and debated among the delegates. We also had the chance to interact and hear from some of the newly elected International Executive Board members. Newly elected UAW International President Shawn Fain and Secretary-Treasurer Margaret Mock presided over the meeting. President Fain spoke to the delegates about the upcoming negotiations and called for unity amongst our memberships. Congratulations to President Fain and all the newly elected members of our IEB.

The Hoffman-Combs Scholarship submissions have concluded and we will be sending those off to Thomas More University professors to determine the three winners. We will announce and give recognition to the winners at our June retiree meeting. I would like to thank all of the 2023 seniors who submitted essays to be eligible for the scholarships and wish them good luck.





MetLife Open Enrollment will take place between April 17, 2023, and May 26, 2023. You can increase one increment on your Optional Life and Dependent Life without a statement of health. You can make these options online at ww.mybenefits.metlife.com or call 1-833-552-3673. While you are making these elections be sure to verify your beneficiaries are accurate. I will have MetLife in the building on May 9, 2023, from 6:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. if you have any questions. They can not however increase your policy here at the plant, you will need to do online or call.

Optum Rx concerns:

I have been getting some concerns about Optum Rx from both our Active and Retiree's. I was hoping it would be a smooth transition for everyone, but there have been a few snags. Most of the time the issue is that Optum Rx is requesting a Prior Authorization from the doctor, if this is the case with your prescriptions, please make sure your doctor is submitting the Prior Authorization. If you are having other issues call the number on your card for Optum Rx customer service. If you need assistance because you have exhausted all avenues and still getting nowhere, please call me so I can reach out to my Optum Rx representative.

I have mentioned this time and time again, when you are going for Physical Therapy and you have National PPO BCBS plan you MUST go in NETWORK with Theramatrix (see the back of your card) Go to the website to find in network locations at www.theramatrix.com or call the number on the back of your card. You will be paying out of pocket if you go out of network. It is imperative that you stay in network with all your coverages. It is your responsibility to make sure you are going to an IN-NETWORK provider. If you have any doubts, go to the websites, and verify or call the number of the back of your cards.

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Women's Committee Report by Debbie Swope-Johnson, Chair



March was International Women's Month. The UAW Women's Committee and the salary Sharonville Women in Manufacturing/Women of Ford (WiM/WoF) chapter both set up displays in the plant cafeteria.

The Women's Committee display honored women who were first or most senior in particular categories. The display was called, "UAW LOCAL 863 FEMALE TRAILBLAZERS." It honors the women who hired in 1972, as well as several others over the years that followed who have made an impact in our UAW Local 863 history.

This year, two more names were added to the display:

Retiree **Lois Working** was the first elected female Bargaining Committeeperson of Local 863. She hired in May of 1974 at the age of 23. She was elected as Bargaining Committeeperson and served two terms in that position from 1996-1999 and 2005-2008. She was also an elected District Committeeperson, a Delegate to the 31st UAW Constitutional Convention, and a trainer for the team building program called Continuous Improvement Work Groups (CIWG). She retired in October 2008.

Darlene Oakes was the first UAW female certified as a 6-Sigma Black Belt. She hired in April of 1992. In 2001, she became a Quality Operating Systems Coordinator (QOSC), a newly created position to help improve quality at Ford. The UAW fought to get QOSC jobs for the hourly workforce. In 2009, Darlene became the first UAW female to be

certified as a 6-Sigma Black Belt. In 2015, using Black Belt methodology, Darlene and several fellow employees created an Innovative Communication Process for Deaf employees at Sharonville Transmission Plant. This process was rolled out through all of Ford Motor Company for Deaf and Hearing-Impaired employees, and she considers it as one of her most rewarding accomplishments since working at Ford. Darlene was appointed the UAW Benefits Representative in 2018. To quote Darlene, "In my current position as the UAW Benefit Representative, I have been able to help the membership and our retirees in so many ways, it has been a humbling experience. Remember this - "People don't care how much you know, until they know how much you care." -John C. Maxwell.

We have a great workforce here at STP and I would love to mentor our young women in becoming strong leaders in the future. Ladies do not wait get involved, learn all you can and gain respect by doing great things, become the person others will want to follow.

The plan is to continue adding "**Trailblazing Women**" to the display each year which adds to the fabric of our UAW Local 863 history.

Education Committee Report by Monique Stanfield, Chair



The Month of May is Mental Health Awareness Month. Each year millions of Americans face the reality of living with a mental illness.

Mental illnesses affect 19% of the adult population, 46% of teenagers and 13% of children each year. People struggling with their mental health may be in your family, live next door, teach your children, work in the next cubicle or sit in the same church pew.

How many of us know what Mental

Illness Is? A mental illness is a physical illness of the brain that causes disturbances in thinking, behavior, energy or emotion that make it difficult to cope with the ordinary demands of life. Research is starting to uncover the complicated causes of these diseases which can include genetics, brain chemistry, brain structure, experiencing trauma and/or having another medical condition, like heart disease.

The two most common mental health conditions are:

Anxiety Disorders – More than 18% of adults each year struggle with some type of <u>anxiety disorder</u>, including <u>post-traumatic stress disorder</u> (PTSD), <u>obsessive-compulsive disorder</u> (OCD), <u>panic disorder</u> (panic attacks), <u>generalized anxiety disorder</u> and specific <u>phobias</u>.

Mood Disorders – Mood disorders, such as <u>depression</u> and <u>bipolar</u> <u>depression</u>, affect nearly 10% of adults each year and are characterized by difficulties in regulating one's mood.

However, only half of those affected receive treatment, often because of the stigma attached to mental health. Untreated, mental illness can contribute to higher medical expenses, poorer performance at school and work, fewer employment opportunities and increased risk of suicide.

By raising awareness of the normalcy and importance of mental health care, others will be less fearful of the stigma," Wolf's office said.

CAP Committee Report by Ben Brady, Chair



According to Gallop polling, popularity for unions is at 68%, the highest percentage since 1965 in the United States. That is great news for workers who want to collectively bargain for a voice in their workplaces. That is also bad news for workers if corporations and legislators have their way.

This year, the UAW will negotiate more than 200 existing workplace contracts, including the big three: Ford, GM and Stellantis (formerly Chrysler). While there have been collective bargaining gains at John Deere, and ratified contracts at Case New Holland and Caterpillar, we will need to stand in Solidarity to see improvements in future contracts. Corporations will not make negotiations easy and we should also be aware that what we win in bargaining, can be stripped from us legislatively.

Legislatively this year, Senator Rand Paul has already proposed stripping workers of their rights to collectively bargain through a National Right to Work bill. And while it has little chance of passing without a veto from the President, if the executive, legislative and judicial branches were held by those with the same priorities to weaken unions, it could very well pass in todays political climate.

In Ohio, two bills will have a great chance of passing the supermajority in the General Assembly. **Senate Bill 83** would prohibit college educators and staff from their ability to strike for better contracts. *Why is this important?* Imagine how much leverage we would have if we did not have our ability to strike. If the legislation makes our solidarity weaker, then we have less to leverage when bargaining for new contracts. We need to support public educators for their ability to collectively bargain by all means possible, because once workers from one labor union are attacked, the legislation will grow to include other labor unions in the private sector.

The other bill. House Joint **Resolution 1**, would change the way public ballot amendments are handled and passed in Ohio. HJR1 would make bringing a ballot amendment to voters harder by requiring that signatures be collected from all 88 counties on the state instead of at least 44 counties. Would do away with a 10 day cure period to collect signatures if the original signatures failed to meet the minimum requirements, and it would require voters to pass the ballot amendment by 60% instead of 50% +1. Why is this important to union labor members? In 2011, Ohioans rejected Senate bill 5 by 60.2% to protect the rights of public workers to collectively bargain contracts. If we stay at the current 50%+1 to pass then that sends an overwhelming message to the supermajority in the Ohio General Assembly that Ohioans want to keep collective bargaining as a right in Ohio. If HJR1 passes, and if we are forced to pass at 60.2% on a ballot amendment, the same message would barely make a mark and the likelihood in todays political climate could even make it hard to get 60% unless we stand and voter in solidarity together.

But it also affects any other ballot measure put forth by the voters. These bills make life harder for Ohioans to get ahead and have the future freedoms to be successful.

Let us stand in Solidarity to protect our collective bargaining rights and help those who also want their rights to freely and fairly collectively bargain for better quality of life in and out of the workplace.


Recreation Committee Report by Chad Turner Chair


