Good day to my fellow UAW Brothers and Sisters. I hope everyone had a happy Thanksgiving with your family and friends!

For my December Transmitter article, I would like to discuss UAW history that took place in the months of November and December. I am going to take you back to 1935; I want the younger members of the UAW to know and understand the benefits they receive didn't come easy. On the streets of Detroit, an army of unemployed men and women marched from plant gate to plant gate in desperate search for work. In a scene that would be repeated a half a century later, grown men were standing on street corners holding handmade signs begging for work. Those lucky enough to have jobs were forced to work under conditions <u>designed to break their spirit</u>. Wages were very low and constantly falling lower.

In the fall a toolmaker named **Walter Reuther,** who had been fired from Ford Motor Company because management disliked his radical politics, returned to Detroit from a prolonged tour of Europe and Russia.

Reuther and his younger brother Victor stepped into this Labor tinder box with the express purpose of turning the tiny United Auto Workers Union into a force that could not be ignored by the auto industry titans. Realizing the strength in numbers, the Reuther brothers and other organizers urged the individual weak unions on Detroit's west side to pool their resources. In September 1936, their organizing effort led to the formation of UAW Local 174. Walter Reuther, then all of 29 years old, became their president. The small Local was compromised of only 78 members.

Their first target was Kelsey-Hayes wheel company, which produced wheels and brake drums, mostly for Ford. Kelsey-Hayes was chosen for two reasons. It had a relatively small workforce-roughly 5,000 employees. The fledgling Local stood a better chance of organizing Kelsey-Hayes than the massive Ford Rouge complex. The organizers decided to concentrate on department 49 at the McGraw Avenue plant. The foreman enjoyed representing each and every one of you and the future of the Sharonville Transmission Plant to the fullest.

As we move forward into 2023 our schedules and volumes are strong. The Company is now anticipating a hiring mode around April to add a midnightshift in 10R Assembly areas. Although this is anticipated, we all know the struggles that we are still currently experiencing with part shortages and supplier issues that continue to impact hiring. 2023 is a monumental year as we enter the last year of our current Contract and begin Local and National Negotiations. Remember - Local **Resolutions and National Resolutions must be submitted by** January 6, 2023. Local Resolution Forms and National Resolutions Forms are available in the Plant Union Office.

riding roughshod over poorly paid workers who were hired in at only 37.5 cents an hour. Women were paid only 22.5 cents an hour for the same job. The site was ripe for organizing.

On Monday, December 30, 1936, the Union called a general sit-down strike in both plants to protest Kelsey-Hayes' refusal to bargain fairly. Some 500 men and women remained inside the plants while workers from across Detroit rallied outside and blocked the entrances. As the days wore on, Kelsey-Hayes came under increasing pressure from its major customer. Ford was running low on parts. Executives from both companies held an emergency meeting at Ford Headquarters. Harry Bennett, the notorious hatchet man for Henry Ford, warned that if the strike was not settled, Ford would go elsewhere for supplies.

On Christmas Eve, Local 174 reached a settlement. It called for an acrossthe-board wage of 75 cents an hour, a shop steward system, a shop committee elected by UAW members, and a seniority system that governed Also, I would like to congratulate Justin Spencer (TM), Bill Sutherland (MR), and Matt Pennington for graduating from the Apprenticeship Program. the order of future layoffs and recall. The Union negotiators secured a 20 percent reduction in the speed of the production line.

It is hard to believe that we will shortly be at the end of 2022. I want to wish everyone a Merry Christmas, Happy Holidays, and a Happy New Year. I know 2023 will be a busy year in the UAW Benefits office with changes coming for both Active and Retirees medical insurances, and negotiations for the UAW National Agreement will likely bring many retirements; so please be patient with response times.

DEPENDENT VERIFICATION for Totally & Permanently Disabled (T&PD) dependents began on

(T&PD) dependents began on October 15, 2022 - this would include dependents who were age 27+ as of December 31, 2021. There are 77 days to get your verification information sent into the Dependent Verification Department 10/15/2022 -12/31/2022, if you received a notice that you need to complete a dependent verification, please do not delay in getting your information sent in immediately. If you have a T&PD dependent and are concerned, you didn't get the packet please call the NESC 1-800-248-444 they will verify whether your dependent is on the list for Dependent Verification. Coverage will be removed for unverified dependents on 1/1/2023.

Attention Retirees: Any members that have been on AETNA will automatically be changed over to UNITED HEALTH CARE as of January 1, 2023. If you want to opt to go to the Blue Cross Blue Shield Traditional Care Plan you needed to call prior to November 30, 2022. Our Prescription coverage for ALL Retiree's (Medicare and NON- Medicare) will also change from Express Scripts to OPTUM Rx as of January 1, 2023. You should be getting all your new cards before the end of December. If you have recently moved or have not received any communications from the UAW Medical Benefits Trust (VEBA) regarding these changes you should call the **RHCC at 1-866-637-7555** ASAP to update or verify your mailing address.

Also, Retirees be sure that you are using your OVER-THE-COUNTER Benefit – call 1-877-218-9951 for a catalog or go to <u>www.uawtrust.org</u>. Don't miss the opportunity if you are Eligible to get anywhere from \$50 -\$150 in over-the-counter drugs or products. The monies for this year will not roll into next year. You must use before the end of December to get the money allotted to you for 2022.

Attention Active Employees Only: Members that have SuperMed Ohio HMO (MedMutual) you will be receiving notification of changes coming to your plan as of January 1, 2023. There will be increases to the office copays, adding copays to Outpatient surgeries, increase in ER copays, added copays to Durable Medical Equipment and added copays for prescription drugs. Please read your information that you received from Ford Benefits regarding these changes. Keep in mind this is NOT the plan that is in our National Agreement (BCBSM) so adjustments can be made outside of the negotiating window. Please call the NESC at 1-800-248-4444 to see your options for change or visit *www.myfordbenefits.com* to review other coverage options after the new year.

I have mentioned this time and time again, when you are going for Physical Therapy and you have National PPO BCBS plan you MUST go in NETWORK with Theramatrix (see the back of your card) Go to the website to find in network locations at <u>www.theramatrix.com</u> or call the number on the back of your card. You will be paying out of pocket if you go out of network. It is imperative that you stay in network with all your coverages. It is your responsibility to make sure you are going to an IN-NETWORK provider. If you have any doubts, go to the websites and verify or call the number of the back of your cards.

A lot of preparation by many people goes into making this great event come together, as well as those who volunteer the day of the event. This event would not be possible without our wonderful volunteers.



Let's Talk About It ...

I can not believe how fast 2022 has come and gone. December being the first month of winter, Christmas is here, and we are about to say, "Hello to 2023!" I have learned a lot, seen a lot and been through a lot over the past year. I am hoping that you begin to invest in yourselves and your health.

Yes, it is definitely hard to focus on myself. Hospitals are battling incoming cases of COVID, rhinoviruses, flu, and RSV (Respiratory Syncytial Virus).

Flu is a contagious respiratory illness caused by influenza viruses that infects the nose, throat and lungs. It has been stated that this flu season is more severe than it has been in 13 years. Flu season is usually between October and May, peaking the most in December and January. This year flu season has arrived 6 weeks earlier with uncharacteristically high illness. Not since 2009 H1N1 swine flu pandemic has there been such a high burden of flu. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention have recorded 880.000 cases of influenza illness, 6,900 hospitalizations and 360 flu-related deaths nationally.

RSV (Respiratory Syncytial Virus)



- Vaccinations (Covid, Flu, RSV).
- Washing your hands with soap and water.
- Clean surfaces such as keyboards, children's toys, telephone, and handles.
- Use tissue to cover mouth and nose when sneezing.
- Refrain from smoking and any activity that weakens the lungs.
- Avoid unnecessary traveling and large crowds.
- Some social distancing.










2. **N.E.S.C.** (National Employee Service Center) 1-800-248-4444 *Pension check and TESPHE 401K monies.*

3. UAW FORD RETIREMENT BOARD 1-800-829-8833 Surviving Spouse Assistance and Survivor Income Benefit Contact.

4. **RHCC** (Retireee Health Care Connect) 1-866-637-7555 Health Care for Retirees through the UAW Medical Benefits Trust & Health Care for Surviving Spouses.

5. UAW Local 863 Headquarters 1-513-563-1252 *Obituary in the Transmitter and a*

Bible in Memory of the Employee or Retiree whom passed.

Survivor Benefits processing can take 60-180 days to be completed. Continue to use current insurance cards until process is complete.


