## Sharonville Report by Rocky Battista



I want to congratulate the newly elected representatives for Local 863, and I also want to Thank our membership for the great voting turn out as well. I am humbled and honored again to be reelected as the Building Chairman. I will continue to work hard for the membership of UAW Local 863.

During the week of May 30 to June 2, 2023, our Bargaining Committee along with our Appointed Representatives taught a training class for all of the newly elected representatives. I want to thank President Turner and the Executive Board for allowing us to put on this training class at the local.

Our schedules and volumes remain strong. 10R assembly are 3044 units per day with plans to work on Saturdays through shutdown, 6R140 at 430 units per day, 6F/8F at 430-530 units per day, and 6R80 at 425 units per day.

On June 7th and 8th, Ford Motor Company's Vice President Bryce Currie and the North American Leadership Team came and toured our plant. This was a great visit for our plant. They left very impressed with our plant and we shined! I want to Thank everyone who led the groups on the tour, all of the presenters, and the membership! Everyone's efforts put us in a great position to get future work in our plant.

Right now the company is planning on bringing in a new hire class the weeks of July 10 and July 17, 2023 to fill the vacancies within the building. We expect there will be around 30 members. When this is completed, all **Transmitter Page 4**  of the job posings that were posted a couple weeks ago will be filled.

The committee and I continue to meet with the company to convert more of our TFT members to senority members. I will keep everyone informed on these talks.

Local negotiations will be kicking off this summer, probably shortly after shutdown, along with National Negotiations. This will be a very busy time for our Local and International Committees. <u>We all need to stand</u> <u>together, more than ever, in</u> <u>Solidarity during this time.</u>

Summer is here - with the heat be the on lookout for signs of heat stroke confusion, slurred speech, altered mental status, hot dry skin, heavy sweating, dizziness, fatigue, weak, rapid pulse, muscle cramps. ### Attention Retirees Only:

This past month anyone who was involved in a Nations Benefits Data Breach received a letter informing you that your personal information may have been compromised in the data breach. THIS IS LEGITIMATE please follow the instructions on the letter and protect yourself from fraud or identity theft. The Nations Benefits Cybersecurity incident impacted members enrolled in the Trust OTC Benefit. The Trust is strongly encouraging members to sign up for the free monitoring offered through Experian's Identity Works - this will provide credit monitoring, identity theft resolution services and \$1 million of identity theft insurance. Members must enroll by August 31, 2023. Enroll online at www.experianidworks.com/credit using the codes provided in your letters. If you lost or threw away your letters you can use code 9PD8R6QSQW or call 1-800-984-8168 use reference code B092082. Credit cards are NOT required for enrollment. If you do not feel comfortable doing this yourself, you should call the UAW Legal Services at 1-800-482-7700 they are ready to help in any way.

We are all very upset that this has happened, unfortunately in the world we live in there are criminals working hard everyday figuring out ways to hack into systems and steal people's private information. Please remember do not give out your personal information over the phone if someone calls you, hang up and block those numbers if possible. The retirees are very important to us, and we want to make sure you have been given the tools to protect yourselves.


I have mentioned this time and time again, when you are going for Physical Therapy and you have National PPO BCBS plan you MUST go in NETWORK with Theramatrix (see the back of your card) Go to the website to find in network locations at <u>www.theramatrix.com</u> or call the number on the back of your card. You will be paying out of pocket if you go out of network. It is imperative that you stay in network with all your coverages. It is your responsibility to make sure you are going to an IN-NETWORK provider. If you have any doubts, go to the websites, and verify or call the number of the back of your cards.

Financial Secretary Report by Cheryl Holland



Thank you to everyone who stepped up and ran for an elected office and Congratulations to everyone who won their elected office.

Anyone who would like to get involved in their union, please sign up to be a member of a committee. Committees you can join are Constitution and Bylaws, Union Label, Education, Conservation and Recreation, Community Services, Civil and Human Rights, Citizenship and Legislative (CAP), Consumer Affairs, Veterans and Women's Committee. All you need to do is fill



The citizens of Ohio have had the unique privilege to have a direct say in state government since September 3, 1912 through the citizen-led ballot initiative. Because the citizens of Ohio had grown tired of the lack of transparency and confidence in their state government, Ohioans petitioned to change the state constitution to give them more power in their state government, a 1 to 1 vote.

Since then, Ohioans have cast votes on 227 citizen initiated and legislative referred constitutional ballot measures, approving 126 and rejecting 101. In 1992, Ohioans approved term limits for government elected officials. In 2011 Ohioans rejected SB5, keeping workers' rights to collective **Transmitter Page 6**  out a committee form. Forms are available at UAW Local 863 Union Hall on Reading Road, or you can ask your committee person to get one to you. Once completed take your form to the UAW Local 863 Hall on Reading Road. All UAW Local 863 members are eligible to join a committee (Ford hourly members, Nurses Unit members, ESFM members, QPC members and HTNA members).

You can educate yourselves this summer with UAW Region 2B's online academy available for all UAW Local 863 members in good standing. Classes available this summer: Understanding Strikes and Understanding Grievances. These classes are all online classes you can take at your leisure. The online classes are free to take. You will need to register for any online classes at: (Facebook)UAW Region 2B or go to

bargaining and in 2015, Ohioans voted against legalizing marijuana.

On August 8, 2023, Ohioans will be asked to change our state constitution (again) through a legislative referred ballot measure. HJR1/SJR2 (House Joint Resolution 1 / Senate Joint Resolution 2) would require a 60% "Yes" vote to pass a constitutional amendment. Under the current constitution, a constitution amendment is passed with a 50% plus 1 majority. HJR1/SJR2 would also make it harder to get issues on the ballot by requiring a majority of signatures from all 88 counties and removing the "cure period" when signatures are turned in. The current constitution requires signatures from 44 counties and allows for a 10 day grace period to confirm and validate signatures or to get additional signatures needed to place an issue on the next election ballot. For the average Ohioan, that means we have to work twice as hard to get an issue on the ballot and then we have a slimmer chance of actually having our voices heard in state

International UAW recently started to have town hall meetings online. You can register to be a part of the online meetings at *uaw.org*.

With the contract coming up in September for UAW Local 863 Ford members, please remember to update any address and phone numbers you may have so that you will receive mailings from the Local, as the Ford Motor Company Labor Relations Department will not share this information with us when you update your address and phone numbers with them. Save your money and make sure you have your medical issues taken care of prior to the contract expiring as well.

Unfortunately, the General Assembly has called for a special election on August 8, 2023 to put this issue before the voters. This is a flip-flop from their previous stance on special elections. Less than 7 months ago, Ohio Secretary of State Frank LaRose and the previous General Assembly voted to no longer have special elections in August due to extremely low voter turn-out and the \$20 million dollar cost to hold special elections.

244 organizations including the AFL-CIO and the UAW, along with faith-based and community advocacy groups oppose HJR1/SJR2 and are asking citizens to **Vote NO on August 8, 2023** to retain citizens' rights on Constitutional ballot initiatives. The Citizens of Ohio should have a larger voice in state government than politicians using the government for political power.

Let's Talk About It...

(Part Two, Continued from Education Committee Report, Transmitter, April 2023 Issue)

Risk Factors for Poor Mental Health: Mental health is described as a state of well-being where a person can cope with the normal stresses of life. This state permits productive work output and allows for meaningful contributions to society.

The following factors, listed below, may affect mental well-being and could increase the risk of developing psychological disorders.

Lifestyle: Your lifestyle can also impact your mental health. Smoking, a poor diet, alcohol consumption, substance use, and risky sexual behavior may cause psychological harm. These behaviors have been linked to depression.

**Environment**: Adverse environmental circumstances can cause negative effects on psychological wellness. For instance, weather conditions may influence an increase in suicide cases. Natural disasters firsthand can increase the chances of developing PTSD. Air pollution may produce negative effects on depression symptoms.

**Childhood Abuse**: When a child is subjected to physical assault, sexual violence, emotional abuse, or neglect while growing up, it can lead to severe mental and emotional distress. Abuse increases the risk of developing mental disorders like depression, anxiety, post-traumatic stress disorder, or personality disorders.

**Biology**: Your biological makeup could determine the state of your wellbeing. A few mental health disorders have been found to run in families and may be passed down to members.



The breach includes your First Name, Middle Initial, Last Name, Gender, Social Security Number, Address, Phone Number, Date of Birth, Medicare Number, and Health Plan Subscriber Identification Number. **Remain vigilant about incidents of identity theft and fraud and monitor free credit reports**.

Enroll in Experians' Identity Works Program before August 31,2023, but the sooner the better! This is two years of free 24/7 credit monitoring.

There will be a proposal on the August 8, 2023 ballot to change the Ohio Constitution so that amendments to the Ohio Constitution would require 60% of voters to approve an amendment instead of the current 50% +1 majority. Why would we give away our vote and voice to legislators that for the most part do not pay attention to us anyway? I urge you to VOTE NO on this issue!!!


